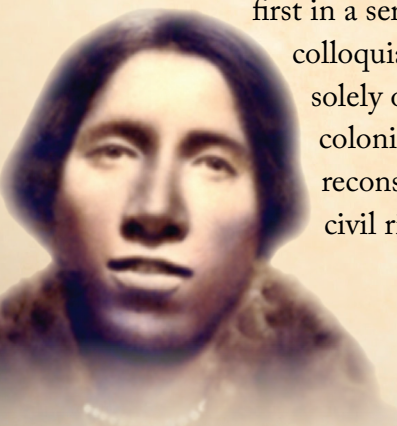


Welcome

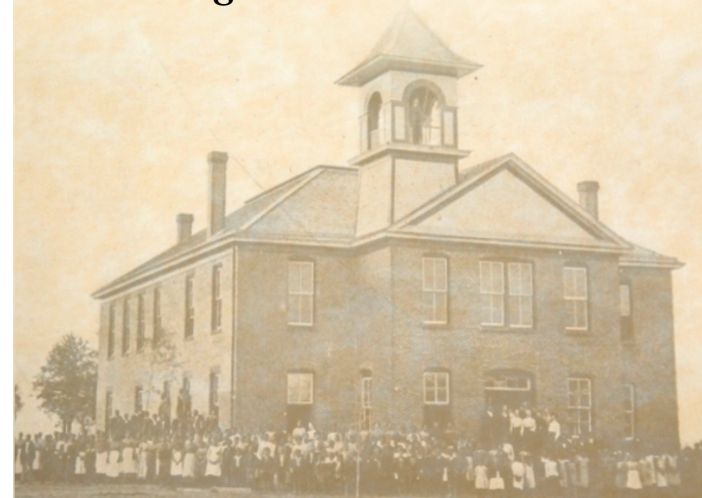
