ABOUT MATERIAL MEMORY, SEASON 3:

Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) occupy a remarkable space in American education, showcasing both the richness of Black intellectual tradition and the tenacity required to thrive in the face of racial hostility and chronic under-resourcing. In the third season of CLIR's podcast, Material Memory, host Sharon M. Burney takes us on a tour of the treasures housed in HBCU library collections and gives us a glimpse into the vital role these institutions play in their communities.
