Shared Print

A top trend in academic and research libraries

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An **agreement** among libraries to retain and share print resources

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participating at scale

"By creating a collaborative collection which elevates the concept of a library collection to scale above a single institution, shared print programs help research libraries to fulfill their mission to preserve the scholarly record in an era of changing usage, limited funding, and space constraints."

Over 400 academic and research libraries in the US and Canada participate

- Tens of millions of monographs and hundreds of thousands of serials and journals titles
- Redefining **collection management** for both
- Growing set of **new tools** for analyzing print



Facilitates repurposing of library space

Supports local collection management and increases visibility of the collection

Expands professional relationships with peer institutions



Provides users with access through resource sharing

Protects print books and journals vital to teaching, learning, research, and scholarship

Morgan State: A Budget Story

The HBCU library challenge: Staffing, budget, and space

Participation in shared print plays a major role in our strategy to compensate for all three of these challenges

USMAI and Shared Print

Local consortia shared print program initially Joined EAST as a consortium to take advantage of program expertise and scale





Negligible print budget

As ownership of significant print is out of our reach, we focus on access EAST offers prioritized access to millions of print titles outside of our local USMAI consortium

Space will be the next challenge we confront

Library losing space to 10 units on campus Safety net of EAST retentions will allow us to weed intelligently



The Aggie Story: Repurposing **Underutilized Space**



Library is a primary space on campus Underutilized for both students and faculty

Accreditation enhanced as University expands programs Access to the EAST Lending Network complements and expands local print resources across disciplines



Allows major re-puposing to create faculty commons, cafe and expand archives

Opportunity Today for 2-3 Libraries

Take advantage of funding from IMLS to join EAST as individual Retention Partners and participate in HBCU Community Cohort:

- No cost analysis of your print monographs to understand unique titles and overlap with EAST
- Little or **no resources required** by your library: EAST and SCELC will provide expertise to export MARC records and undertake the analysis

Estimate size of print collection for analysis Make staff available for record export



EAST reviews local record export and uploads to Gold Rush Analysis and Allocation completed by EAST



Finalizing Retentions

EAST reviews allocations and recommends final retention commitments
